

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church situate at Millbrook aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Maker which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church situate at Millbrook as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Millbrook.'

"And with the like consent of the said Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Millbrook being:—

"All that part of the parish of Maker, situate partly in the county of Devon, and partly in the county of Cornwall, and wholly in the diocese of Exeter, which is comprised within and is bounded by an imaginary line, commencing at a boundary stone, inscribed 'M. D. C. 1869, No. 1,' and placed at or near the south-western end of the premises known as Woodpark Ropewalk, at a point on the south-eastern side of the road which leads along the southern shore of Millbrook Lake, from Woodpark, past the northern side of the house and grounds called Westpark to Millbrook; and extending thence, first south-westward and then westward for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts, along the middle of the said road, to a boundary stone inscribed 'M. D. C. 1869, No. 2,' and placed at or near to the junction of the same road, with the road which leads from Anderton House past the western side of Westpark aforesaid to Maker Heights; and extending thence south-westward and in a direct line for a distance of twenty-two chains or thereabouts, to a boundary stone inscribed 'M. D. C. 1869, No. 3,' and placed on the north-eastern side of the road which leads from Millbrook by Mount Pleasant to Maker, at a point in the middle of the south-western end of the fence which divides the close numbered 343 upon the map of the Ordnance survey, of the said parish of Maker, published in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, and upon the map hereunto annexed, from the close numbered 344 upon

the same maps; and extending thence almost due west, and in a direct line for a distance of seventeen chains or thereabouts to a boundary stone inscribed 'M. D. C., 1869, No. 4,' and placed on the north-eastern side of the road leading from Millbrook to Kingsand, at a point in the middle of the south-western end of the fence dividing the close numbered 328 upon the said maps from the close numbered 327 upon the same maps; and extending thence, still westward, but with a slight inclination to the north, and in a direct line, for a distance of twenty-four chains, or thereabouts (thereby passing to the south of Millbrook Church, and crossing the road leading from Millbrook to Radford), to a boundary stone inscribed 'M. D. C. 1869, No. 5,' and placed on the southern side of the road leading from West-street, Millbrook, to Tregantle, at a point in the middle of the north-western end of the fence which divides the close numbered 289 upon the said maps from the close numbered 290 upon the same maps; and extending thence, north-eastward, and in a direct line, for a distance of eight chains, or thereabouts, to a boundary stone inscribed 'M. D. C. 1869, No. 6,' and placed on the northern side of the road which connects Saint Andrew-street, Millbrook, with the road leading to Tregantle as aforesaid, at a point in the middle of the south-eastern end of the fence dividing the close numbered 284 upon the said maps from the close numbered 304 upon the same maps: and extending thence, north-eastward, and in a direct line, for a distance of twenty chains, or thereabouts, to a boundary stone inscribed 'M. D. C. 1869, No. 7,' and placed on the eastern side of the road called or known as Blindwell-hill, at a point in the middle of the western end of the fence which divides the close numbered 184 upon the said maps from the close numbered 185 upon the same maps; and continuing thence, still north-eastward, and in a direct line, for a distance of twelve and a-half chains, or thereabouts to a boundary stone inscribed 'M. D. C., 1869, No. 8,' and place on the western side of the road leading from Newport-street to Inwork Mill, at a point in the middle of the north-eastern end of the fence which divides the close numbered 188, upon the said maps from the close numbered 191, upon the same maps; and extending thence, first north-eastward to and then alternately north-westward and north-eastward along the middle of the last-described road, to its junction with the road which leads along the northern shore of Millbrook Lake aforesaid, and which is called or known as 'The Garrets,' at or near to which point of junction a boundary stone inscribed 'M. D. C., 1869, No. 9,' has been placed; and extending thence, south-eastward, and in a direct line, for a distance of forty-seven and a half claims or thereabouts across Millbrook Lake, to the first described boundary stone on its southern shore, where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Exeter.
